Executive Summary:

The term of office for Independent Gross-misconduct Members who sit on the panels held by Surrey Police is due to expire at the end of the current Police and Crime Commissioner's term of office (11.59pm on Thursday, 11 May 2016). The Office has been informed that there is one gross-misconduct hearing currently being conducted, which, due to unforeseen circumstances, is now likely to be run beyond this time.

Background:

The Police Reform Act 2002 and the Police (conduct) Regulations 2004 provide that in certain circumstances, an Independent Member will sit on police misconduct panels.

There is no legal limit to the length of time Independent Members can serve.

The experience and continued appointment of this Independent Member is essential to the successful conclusion of this gross-misconduct hearing.

Recommendation:

The PCC is recommended to extend the appointment of the Independent Grossmisconduct Panel Member until August 2016 or until the end of this grossmisconduct hearing, whichever is the latter.
