1.0 Executive Summary

- 1.1 In October 2014, the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) took on responsibility for commissioning support services for victims of crime to help them cope and recover.
- 1.2 For the financial year 2017/18 the PCC was allocated £1,370,103 by the Ministry of Justice for the commissioning and/or provision of emotional and practical support services for victims' of crime.
- 1.3 In accordance with the Police and Crime Commissioner's Commissioning Strategy, a proportion of this funding is set aside at the start of the financial year to support a number of 'core services'. A proportion of funding is also made available to support ad-hoc projects and initiatives and on this basis the PCC has agreed to the following funding requests:

2.0 Agreed funding

3.0 North Surrey Domestic Abuse Services: DA Outreach Advocate

2.1 To support the continuation of the Domestic Abuse Outreach Advocate pilot. This DA Specialist works alongside officers in the Area Policing Teams (APT) and Safeguarding Investigation Unit (SIU) to provide an enhanced level of support to survivors of domestic abuse, whilst supporting the professional development of officers and staff. Data for the previous year of operation shows a clear increase in positive outcomes and the number of offences being classified as high and medium risk.

Total: £25,000

2.2 RASASC: (multiple)

2.3 To support a 'bank' of qualified trauma counsellors who can help to support survivors of rape and sexual abuse. RASASC does not currently have enough volunteer counsellors with the specialist skills to deliver specialist trauma counselling. Whilst initial counselling assessments are currently undertaken very quickly, the waiting list for commencement of counselling sessions now exceeds 12 months. During this time the mental health of victims tends to decline further and their chance of overcoming the trauma is reduced.

2.4 This project will address the problem by developing a 'bank' system. This will see the recruitment of 6 counsellors who have the skills and flexibility to deliver professional trauma counselling to highly vulnerable clients for up-to twenty-six sessions. RASASC's Trustee Board have approved funding for a further six, so combined with OPCC funding brings the total number to 12.
