How your Council Tax helps fund Surrey Police

Over 200 officers and staff in two years...

Your contributions through the policing element of the council tax mean Surrey Police can continue to strengthen their service by putting more officers back into our communities.

Over the next year, around an extra 100 police officers and 50 staff will be added to the Surrey Police establishment to help tackle crime and those issues that matter to you.

In 2020/21, the Force will receive central funding for an extra 78 police officers as part of the government's programme to increase numbers nationally by 20,000 over the next three years.

This will be further boosted by the 3.8% rise in this year's council tax precept which 60% of those who took part in our public survey in January supported. This will allow the Chief Constable to invest in further officers and staff which residents across Surrey tell me they want to see.

Combined with the extra 79 officers and staff and 25 posts saved thanks to last year's precept - this means that by the end of this financial year, over 200 posts will have been added to the police establishment.

After a decade where police resources have been stretched to the limit, I believe this is really good news for residents.

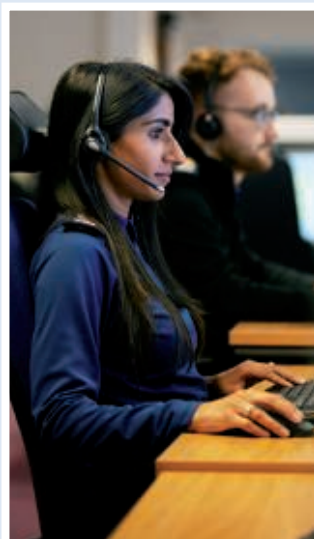
