## 300 extra officers and staff in two years

Over the next year Surrey Police can continue to strengthen the service they provide in our communities thanks to your contributions through the policing element of the council tax.

An extra 150 officers and operational support roles will be added to the Surrey Police establishment during 2021/22 to help tackle those issues that matter to you.

This year's precept rise will allow the Force to invest in an extra 77 officer and operational staff roles to add to the 73 officers that will be paid for by central government as the next tranche of the 20,000 promised nationally.

Combined with the 150 roles added over the last year, it means since 2020 Surrey Police will have grown their establishment by an additional 300 officers and staff which is good news for residents.

Asking the public to pay more for their policing during this really difficult time is one of the toughest decisions I've faced as your PCC which was reflected by the even split in our public consultation on this year's 5.5% increase.

But I believe the role our police teams play in Surrey's communities is more important now than ever as we continue to face up to the challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic.

83 police officers and 67 operational staff in 2021/22 will bolster Surrey Police's neighbourhood policing teams, enhance the response to rural crime and contribute to a new team dedicated to tackling the impact of the 'fatal five' on Surrey's roads (speed, drink or drugs, distractions, seatbelt, carelessness).

- Neighbourhood Investigative Officers
- Digital contact staff
- Trained Intelligence gathering and research analysts
